BRILL CAR RESTORATION

Restoration work on Death Valley Railroad Car #5 is progressing along nicely. From the spring of 2000 until fall of 2001, the motorcar was disassembled and cleaned down to the framework. The framework was then painted with primer and new sheet metal side panels were cut and riveted back onto the car. The riveting process took some time, as none of the volunteers had ever done hot

riveting. We learned fast and 1000s of rivets were reset into the panels. After riveting, the exterior of the car was deemed stable enough to move the trucks from beneath the car for cleaning and reconditioning.



The trucks took many months of hard work to remove all the rust, corrosion and dirt, which were firmly caked to every nook and cranny. The brake levers and linkages were removed and stripped to bare metal to enable them to move freely so the brake shoes can be pressed against the wheels. The trucks are now completely restored, in working order, and re-installed under the car, as is almost all of the brake linkage system. At present we are re-installing the air system that operates the brakes.

A new wood roof has been constructed and is awaiting its canvas covering. Finding the proper 1927-type material to cover the wood roof has become a new challenge. The new oak floor is in, and will allow some of the support pieces of the undercarriage to be attached through the floorboards.

Over the next few months, the car will continue to take shape, and everyone will see what the motorcar looked like when it was new. The exterior will be repainted the original green (as close as we can make it), and the lettering and numbers will be replaced as shown in the factory pictures.

MULE DAYS BOOTH

The O.V.R.C. set up and staffed a small informational booth at the Crafts Show held in the Bishop City Park during Mule Days over the Memorial Weekend. Several hundred people visited the booth to learn about the tourist railroad and hear the progress on the restoration of the Brill Car. We added several new members, sold several merchandise items, and raffle tickets. Altogether we raised almost \$900 for the O.V.R.C. projects. We now have 150 members in the O.V.R.C. Eight different members staffed the booth for the long weekend, including three people for the first time, Gloria Leesen, John Martindale, and Noe Gadea. We plan on having another booth set up during the Tri-County Fair over Labor Day Weekend.

RAILWAY RESTORATION NEWS

As reported in our last Newsletter, our application for grant funding for partial rail route work was approved and accepted by all political entities involved. We have received word from Inyo County (the lead agency in this project) that they are going out for bids for a contractor to perform the environmental studies required for this project.
